The second weekend of August brings a new sermon series into the book of Daniel. In chapter one we learn that the teenager Daniel resolved or purposed in his heart not to defile the LORD. It was a new chapter in his life, and it was as if to pray, as Jesus taught us, "thy will be done, thy kingdom come" — a prayer we pray every day in our homes, and every week in worship. With school starting, leaves soon to fall, and a new chapter in our lives unfolding, will we be as resolved as Daniel? The good news is, Jesus is the greater Daniel and He is resolute for us. Jesus invites us in Matthew with this invitation:

"Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." Matthew 11:28–30 (ESV)

As I write this, I am in the final days of the blessing of a Sabbatical and I am reminded that this provision from Faith Lutheran is a gift. In other words, like our weekly Sabbath routine, we are called to work from the rest the LORD invites us to and gifts us with. We don't earn it — we receive it, and then respond with the resolution of Daniel because we have the strength of the LORD.

"This is My Body"

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

We take so very much for granted in the modern world. It should not surprise you that we do the same as we worship. There is even much having to do with the Lord's Supper that we do because "we've always done it that way." We receive Christ's body in the form of "bread" ... either a loaf baked by a local store or one of those wafers purchased in bulk from a church supplier. Why do we receive the real presence of the body of our Lord in these forms? Because that's the way we at Faith "always" have.

It seldom occurs to us that the bread we receive bears little resemblance to that which Jesus actually offered his disciples and other followers.

I'd been going along for more than twenty years acting in a pastoral role in churches in four states and six congregations never giving communion bread a second thought. I concentrated on the people who would receive the sacrament of the altar, but whatever bread was laid upon the altar by those who served in our sacristy was merely the local custom.

And then a young man came into my life this past spring. The younger man was introduced to me by his father. (I'll withhold both names to preserve their privacy.)

My younger friend had come into possession of a sack of Khorasan wheat. This wheat has been grown for hundreds of years in the country of Turkey, at the foot of Mt. Ararat. The Khorasan legend is that this wheat was carried aboard Noah's ark as it came to ground at Mt. Ararat. It has been grown in that area of the world, and other places, ever since.

This nutritious (and delicious, I'm told) grain made its way to New Mexico in the hands of my new friend, and one acre has been planted in a donated field in Corrales. Each grain was planted by my friend alone. His prayer is that enough grain will eventually be harvested so that it can be given to worshipping communities (churches) so that they may receive Christ's presence in a very special, meaningful way. Given to my friend with no price attached, he intends to give it to others freely as well.

I have no experience at all with farming. But through my as-yet brief experience in this wheat field I have learned much from my expert coach. I have learned once again that when Jesus teaches us, he speaks on many levels at once. For example, when He says, "this is my body" and when pastors repeat these words as we share the eucharist, He is declaring more than His mystical presence in the bread we receive before the altar.

I have learned in that hot Corrales field that actual sweat and blood is shed by the farmer as the ground and crop is tended. It has been my privilege to have dropped my own sweat along the rows of wheat as I have weeded the crop. I've also dropped a bit of my blood on that same ground as thorns from some of those weeds pricked my fingers. The young Khorasan plants' roots take up my sweat and blood along with the other nutrients of the soil. The same is most certainly true for my young mentor as he has put hundreds of hours of toil in that field.

Jesus lived in an agrarian society. Almost everybody worked, perspired, and bled in the first century fields of His time. So, when Christ said, "this is my body" He knew, and His hearers knew, the essence of what their ancient grain held. The presence of Christ and that of the community was being shared for the benefit of all.

Wouldn't it be amazing if we could share the same thing in our time? How meaningful would that be for us all?

My young friend has this very vision. The small amount of help he has from his father and I, we pray, will bring in a bit of a harvest later this year ... if the Good Lord is willing. And if this effort is successful, next year Faith may have a bit of grain to cultivate on its own. A community will be needed to plant, nurture, harvest, and grind into flour our own crop. Some folks will also be needed to bake our communion bread (likely only for "special occasions" like Maundy Thursday – the celebration of the Lord's Supper). And yes, one or more places will be needed to actually plant our Khorasan.

In this way, it will not just be the farmers who become our bread of the covenant, it will be all who toil to produce our bread who join with Christ in this way. I pray that there may be many at Faith who come to know the full meaning of "this is my body" as the people in Christ's own time surely understood. Let me know if you are interested in becoming involved next spring.

This summer of 2023 we began the second year of our youth ministry internship. The youth ministry internship program began in summer of 2022. This internship and discipleship program is targeted at young adults/college students who are interested in vocational ministry. This 10-week internship is meant to give the intern a unique insight into vocational ministry — not only into youth and children's ministry, but also into ministry in general. Further, and most importantly, this internship allows for one-on-one discipleship. Throughout the summer the intern and myself work through studies aimed at spiritual discipline, Biblical literacy, and most importantly their relationship with Jesus Christ. Internship duties include chaperoning on all youth trips during the summer, leading small group devotions, helping with the youth area, going to pastoral visits, learning about teaching, leadership skills, etc...

She is currently a full-time student at the University of New Mexico. This Summer she is serving as a leader with Group Mission trips in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

Our 2023 summer intern is Ahren Thorson, who grew up at FLC. He was part of one of the first classes to go through Children of Faith preschool right here at Faith. He also grew up in the FLC children and youth ministries, still attending the Young Adult Ministry when he is in town. Ahren is a full-time student at Western New Mexico University.

It has been amazing and humbling to see how God is working through these young adults as they learn, grow, and serve. Please keep them in your prayers as they continue to lead and serve!
